Our Judge

Mark Rospenda's meticulous nature always presents itself through his work. Using paper as a means of exploring the delicate, mutable nature of our thinking processes, he physically cuts it into shreds and converts his drawing into pulp. Parts and elements are exchanged between works with some evolving over a number of years. The images that result are moments within a stream of thinking and forgetting – records of memories lost, found and transforming. His work has been exhibited at the Spartanburg Art Museum, Spartanburg, SC; DEMO Project, Springfield, IL; Herron Galleries, Indianapolis, IN; and other locations nationally. Upcoming exhibition include Dream Clinic, Columbus OH 2025; and COOP Gallery, Nashville, IN 2026.

From 2011-2022, he was Curator at the South Bend Museum of Art, where he organized and oversaw more than 125 exhibitions. Since 2021, his artwork has been included in the White Columns Curated Artist Registry. Rospenda lives and works in South Bend, IN where he is Adjunct Faculty in Fine Arts and Gallery Director at Indiana University-South Bend.

Judge's Comments

Outstanding in Watercolor

One of the main characteristics I examine when I judge artworks is the handling of the medium. Does the medium enhance the message I think the artist is trying to convey? And is the artist taking chances with the medium? The answer is "yes" to both questions in Vicki Sczepankiewicz Yates's, *Wild Things*. I fully appreciate the range of mastery on display. The image feels alive while also acknowledging its artifice in areas where the artist allows watercolor to just be watercolor and bleed and flow (as water does!). As a whole, the image simultaneously exudes life while exclaiming "Yes, I am a watercolor on paper—aren't I magical?"

Outstanding in Oil

Morgan Watters's, *Tummy-Tum-2 Years Old*, made me giggle when I first read the title. That's the hook for this little gem. After my giggle, I began to wonder about the oddness of the Frankenstein's monsteresque bear that's depicted. I don't know the narrative, but the painting also doesn't make me feel like an outsider looking in, unable to make any connection to the work. There's room for the viewer to make their own associations. And if nothing else, one can appreciate the subtle handling of the medium — the coloration of reflected light, shadowing and range of values and textures. It's a gorgeous gumdrop of a painting. And there was that initial giggle, too.

Outstanding in Acrylics

How many images of sunrises and sunsets do we encounter in our lives? I don't know if there's a quantifiable average. But it's a lot. So it really is something when an artist can take a subject that is such a cliché, and imbue it with dynamism, life, and just enough oddity to capture the attention of even the most cynical art judge. There is individual style on display in Teresa Kawaguchi's, *Awakening*. The coordinated use of color and shape define this image, giving an ephemeral moment a weightiness, energy and sense of majesty. My eye is also drawn to the strange seam in the sky— almost like a line of reflection. I find it slightly unsettling, and indicates that the awakening of this day is not a typical one.

Outstanding in Photography

Jesus Salome Arriaga's complex image, "Pocho" Self-Portrait I, from "Ni De Aqui (-) Or There" Series, addresses personal identity within the present political climate and this country's evolving positions on immigration and inclusion. The subject of the image is wearing a Mexican serape and stands near a similarly sized American flag hanging from a structure used by photographers for backdrops. Which design should this subject "wear" and identify with? Does either fit? The image conveys a sense of displacement and vulnerability that speaks volumes.

Outstanding in Mixed Media

Mary Amador's, Somos Semillas - We Are Seeds, is an exuberant message of resilience and hope. The central figure in the painting seems to be transforming into a reality that extends beyond the canvas as represented by a number of materials more traditionally associated with fiber arts. Generally, threads are used to hold things together. And within the world of this artwork, this motif is found in the sacred heart, the birds, and the strands that are incorporated into the background flower — as if exploding into the world from figure. A wonderful message in a world that could use more light and hope.

Outstanding in Sculpture

Two red-tailed hawks magically emerge from a piece of wood in Efraine Saune's, *Love Birds*. Pattern, color and form describe the birds as they intertwine and encircle each other as they seem to take flight. I especially love how thin areas of the wood. It reminds me of how marble is transformed into twigs and translucent leaves at the end of Daphne's fingertips in Bernini's, *Apollo and Daphne* (1622–1625)—the way the artist stretches the medium to its limit. *Love Birds* is a tour de force on a small scale. It makes me wonder what the artist could accomplish with a larger piece of sourced wood (how about a whole tree?).

Outstanding Not in a Main Media

This was perhaps the most difficult category to judge, as the works and media were so varied. But my eye kept returning to Brenda Ramseler's, *Rusty Treasure*. The mark making is extremely fine, nuanced and layered. It heightens the feeling of discovering something in the forest (a forest of trees and a forest of marks on paper). The world of the image is unified and believable. And

perhaps I have read too many Stephen King books, but I find myself speculating about the car. The interior is lost in shadow and we're only allowed to see the grill that toothily grins at us. It has a sinister quality. Perhaps some rusty treasures are best left hidden.

Best in Show

There were so many artworks that could have won Best in Show. But I decided that medium, message, style, and ambition all reach a fever pitch in Heidi Bailey's, *Surrender Splendor*. It's an explosion of energy, ideas, materials — and cake! Yet it all formally holds together through the artist's use of color, shape, and the visual repetition of plastic decorative elements. The abundance of pastels and pinks complement delicate ceramic teapots and cups. And the cake-like form is topped with an altered found-porcelain figurine of a woman who has been graffitied with words often used to define the role of women in society. The figurine is enclosed within a simplified form of a house which reads as a cage or prison. Everything is exploding out from the center—to me symbolizing a severing from traditional, patriarchal ideas of women's roles. It's a captured moment of change and transformation—a wonderful message and such an energizing and layered work!
